

Area Attractions

Hurricane is the gateway to exploring Utah's fabulous collection of national parks, monuments, state parks all within a day's drive. Here are some sample travel distances:

- 17 miles - Zion National Park
- 58 miles - Cedar Breaks National Monument
- 110 miles - Bryce Canyon National Park
- 130 miles - Grand Canyon North Rim
- 130 miles - Lake Powell

Hurricane is proud to be the home of two of Utah's most popular State Parks: Quail Creek and Sand Hollow. These parks offer boating, water skiing, fishing, and OHV activities.

Hurricane is also home to popular off road mountain biking areas: the Hurricane Canal Rim Trail system which includes the Gould's Rim Trail, the J.E.M. Trail, and the Prospector Trail. Goosbery Mesa is only a few minutes outside the city limits.

Visitors can also golf on two of the most scenic courses in the state: the city owned Sky Mountain Golf Course and Sand Hollow Resort which is open to the public.

Area Events



OHV Definitions

ALL-TERRAIN TYPE I VEHICLE:

Any motor vehicle fifty two inches (52") or less in width, having an unladen dry weight of eight hundred (800) pounds or less, traveling on three (3) or more low pressure tires, having a seat designed to be straddled by the operator and designed for or capable of travel over unimproved roads.

ALL-TERRAIN TYPE II VEHICLE:

Any other motor vehicle not defined herein as an "all-terrain type I vehicle" designed for or capable of travel over unimproved terrain. This term does not include golf carts, any vehicle designed to carry a disabled person, any vehicle not specifically designed for recreational use, or farm tractors as defined under section 41-1a-102 of the Utah code.

MOTORCYCLE:

Every motor vehicle having a saddle for the use of the operator and designed to travel on not more than two (2) tires.

OFF HIGHWAY VEHICLE:

All all-terrain type I and type II vehicles and motorcycles, but shall not include snowmobiles. (Ord. 03-3-20, 3-20-2003; amd. Ord. 2004-12, 4-15-2004; Ord. 2009-14, 10-1-2009)

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The City of Hurricane allows for the operation of ATV and non-licensed dirt bikes on designated city streets as prescribed by City Ordinance 7-1-8.

OHV Registration Requirements

Unless exempted under Section 41-22-9 of Utah Code, all OHVs must be registered in accordance with the requirements of title 41, chapter 22 of the Utah Code for the current year.

OHV Equipment Requirements

OHVs operating on city streets must be equipped with the following:

1. Functional Brakes.
2. A noise control device conforming to U.S. Forest Services standards.
3. Working headlights and taillights when operated between sunrise and sunset.

Safety, Licensing, Other Restrictions

1. OHV operators must have a valid driver's license, a Utah state issued safety certificate, or be under the direct supervision of a certified off highway safety instructor during a scheduled safety course.
2. All persons under 18 must wear a D.O.T. approved helmet.
3. Persons under the age of eight may not operate an OHV on city streets. Persons under the age of 16 must be under the direct supervision of an adult at least 18 years of age.
4. OHVs on private property must have permission of the owner and, if not, must immediately leave upon request of the owner. OHVs cannot block an entrance or exit to private property.
5. OHVs cannot be operated in connection with criminal activities.
6. OHV operators must obey all applicable local and state traffic laws.
